How is the final grade for the course determined? (Please list all required assignments, assessments, etc.)

The final involves two parts: a comprehensive and a final project that requires students to research the Ohio Revised Code and find the elements of the crime. They are then required to determine the common forms of evidence that are found at this crime scene.

The final grade includes several parts. There are discussion questions each week, a weekly quiz and four written assignments. The four assignments are a paper dealing with eye witness testimony, a paper review of a criminal case that was solved through forensic evidence, a time line power point that revolves around the written paper case where the student prepares the evidence as if they were presenting it to a prosecutor and finally a paper that requires students to research the Ohio Revised Code and find the elements of the crime. They are then required to determine the common forms of evidence that are found at this crime scene.

The high school instructor's grade and the faculty pathway specialist reviews final grade submissions for college credit consideration.
